Mr. Miller highlighted that recreation programs are doing well. Mr. Miller is reaching out to entities, like Pintsize Picasso's and Lakeside Golf, to offer discounts to members to help add more value to the membership.

FOLLOW UP WITH PARENT'S EMPOWERED

Ms. Kaiser reported that artwork throughout the building has been installed and that the kick-off event was held March 18th, 2022.

**Mayor Westergard arrived at 3:50 p.m.

The event was promoted as a free entry event with attendees eligible to enter several giveaways. They also set up several tables to talk to parents and families about having discussions of underage drinking. Ms. Kaiser shared photos of the event and an article in the Davis Journal.

UPDATE ON BOND COST PROJECTIONS

**Chairman Todd Meyers arrived at 3:55 p.m.

Jay Baughman introduced himself and presented an updated analysis from the previous 2020 analysis that was completed. Mr. Baughman reported that the Board has 2 scenarios before them to analyze based on the configuration of the satellite facility and field spaces.

Mr. Baughman reviewed that the 2020 analysis estimated a satellite facility at \$23.8 million, estimated existing facility improvements at \$15.9 million, and estimated the operations and maintenance at \$249,600. Since that original analysis some things have changed, and they have updated them into 2 scenarios.

In scenario 1, North Salt Lake would donate land at Hatch Park for a satellite facility, giving the District a savings of \$4 million. This scenario estimates the satellite facility at \$25 million, purchasing additional land for ball fields at \$3-4 million, and estimated the improvements at the existing facility at \$21.6 million, less a \$6 million donation from Davis School District to use the facilities. Mr. Baughman noted that the School District contribution was not a factor in the original analysis. Scenario 2 is similar to scenario 1, except in scenario 2 the District would purchase land for the satellite facility at an estimated cost of \$4 million and decide whether to have one aggregated campus or spread out in several locations like in scenario 1.

Mr. Baughman continued presenting the property tax impact and funding analysis for both scenarios, discussing the average District home value, and the residential impact for the average home value. Mr. Baughman noted that the current bonds do not expire until 2026 and the analysis has been computed with the expectation that the District would only pay interest until 2026, avoiding stacking the bonds on top of one another.

Mayor Romney asked if the dollar amounts in the residential impact is per month and Mr. Baughman confirmed that is correct. Councilmember Bradshaw mentioned that Bountiful City Council particular concerns was whether a city would step up and donate land, applauded North Salt Lake for doing so and asked if any city was exploring offering something similar. Mayor Romney said West Bountiful is looking into options, but nothing is owned by the city.

Councilmember Summerhays mentioned that Centerville City is looking at some fee increases in their city. Councilmember Summerhays suggested that as the Board be aware of the other potential taxing increases on the same ballot. Councilmember Summerhays said that community centers allow for places of gathering that otherwise wouldn't happen and create the sense of place and community. Mayor Horrocks added that North Salt Lake is looking at some fee increases as well, and they'll be bonding for the Hatch Park expansion with or without the District.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT

Mr. Miller reported that sales have slowed since the peak of January, with EFT's increasing and annual's not as high as expecting.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT

Mr. Miller reported on the following items:

- Ammonia leak on 4/18 where the facility was evacuated, and the faulty compressor is being serviced.
- Egg Dive was held on 4/16 and was one of the largest dive's
- Recreation Programs started the week of 4/11

Mr. Miller introduced Kaylie Glissmeyer as the new Customer Service Manager. Mr. Miller mentioned that Lizie Allen resigned as the Aquatic Program Manager.
